

Make! - A season of contemporary craft in the Barbican Shop 17 March to 3 June 2018

The Barbican Shop today announces its first ever season of events, with a series of talks, installations and practical workshops on the theme of making and craftsmanship. *Make!* - A season of contemporary craft in the Barbican Shop will run from 17 March to 3 June 2018, allowing visitors to explore traditional crafts with a contemporary twist, to meet the makers behind some of the shop's favourite products, and to learn new craft skills in a range of workshops.

Curated by the Barbican's retail team in partnership with **Crafts** magazine, the season seeks to challenge people's perceptions of craft by showcasing contemporary makers who are celebrating craftsmanship and helping to redefine its meaning today with the growing popularity of the maker movement. The season will also continue the work of the Barbican Shop in supporting independent crafts talent, offering makers a platform to reveal the inspirations and techniques behind their work.

Highlights of the programme include ring carving workshops with east London collective **The Workbench**, bike building demonstrations and a panel discussion by **The Bicycle Academy**, bookbinding workshops with experts from the **London Centre for Book Arts**, a paper lighting workshop with designer **Kate Colin**, weaving workshops and an installation from tapestry weaver **Christabel Balfour**, a craft walking tour with historian **Chris Rogers**, a series by maker **Phil Cuttance** on casting vases, and a stitching workshop by the **Stitch School** alongside an interactive stitching cloth installation in the Barbican Shop.







The Barbican is a leading international arts and learning centre, and much of the season will take place in the recently expanded Barbican Shop. Designed by RIBA Stirling Prize-winning practice Allford Hall Monaghan Morris, the 330 square metre shop is spread over two floors, providing room for events and programing that see the shop become an extension of the Barbican's foyer spaces and a destination in its own right.

Make! has been programmed in partnership with Crafts magazine. Published bi-monthly by the Crafts Council, the magazine has covered the most exciting developments in the world of contemporary craft over the past four and a half decades.

Jo Davis, Head of Retail at the Barbican, said: "We are incredibly excited to launch Make! - our first season of events in the Barbican Shop. We have curated a diverse selection of makers, representing a wide range of disciplines from weaving to bike frame making, and are looking forward to showcasing each of their crafts. This is an opportunity to watch the 'making' process happen, as well as a chance to take part, learn something new and walk away with a beautifully unique handmade product."

Grant Gibson, Editor of Crafts magazine, said: "There's absolutely no doubt that craft has undergone a renaissance in recent years, capturing the public's imagination. And we're delighted to be joining forces

with the Barbican to showcase some of the UK's best creative talent this spring. I think visitors will be surprised and delighted."

The Barbican Shop will also showcase selected leading makers as part of a display co-curated by Crafts magazine, including Irina Razumovskaya, Ariane Prin, Victoria Andrew, Alan Olivier and more to be announced via the Barbican website, alongside products available to buy from makers involved in the season's events.

A workshop on the art of bookbinding with experts from the London Centre for Book Arts. Participants will learn the basics of bookbinding, how it can be done simply at home, variations on the pamphlet notebook, and will take home at least three distinct hand-made notebooks with their choice of materials. London Centre for Book Arts is an artist-run, open-access studio providing workshop programmes for the community and access to resources for artists and designers.

Participants can learn to carve their own silver ring from jeweller's wax, which will then be cast into solid silver by The Workbench following the workshop, professionally polished, and delivered back to them. The Workbench is an east London collective established in 2014 that run original, fun and creative jewellery craft nights.

A showcase of the three chairs that were upholstered as part of *Second Sitters vs SCP*, a live upholstery performance that took place at the Geffrye Museum in May 2017. Based in east London, **Second Sitters** is **Hannah Stanton** and **Jude Dennis**, both practicing upholsterers. Together they promote independent UK and international upholsterers through publications, collaborative working and exhibitions. **SCP** is a London based manufacturer of contemporary furniture, accessories, lighting and textiles established by **Sheridan Coakley** in 1985, guided by the idea that design can transform the world around us.

On Bike Building: A panel discussion Thu 3 May, 7.00pm - 9.00pm Frobisher Auditorium 1, Barbican Centre £8

A panel discussion hosted by Andrew Denham of The Bicycle Academy and featuring five of London's best known bespoke bike frame builders - Adeline O'Moreau from Mecredi Bikes, Caren Hartley from Hartley Cycles, Matthew McDonough from Talbot Frameworks, Matthew Sowter from Saffron Bikes, and Tom Donhou from Donhou Bikes. The panellists will talk about how the business and craft of bike building has changed in recent years, including the fresh appreciation for handmade, personalised frames following the revival of craft and increasing popularity of cycling. The discussion will also look at how the builders' previous academic studies and interests have shaped their bike designs, and will conclude with a post-talk Q&A session.

Show bikes by Caren Hartley of Hartley Cycles and Isen Workshop will be displayed in the Barbican Shop following the On Bike Building: A panel discussion event on 3 May. From a small workshop in south London, award-winning frame builder Caren Hartley creates bespoke steel and stainless steel bicycles and will be displaying her Copper Leaf Light Tourer bike. And Isen Workshop (a newly launched collaboration between Caren Hartley and Matt McDonough of Talbot Frameworks) will be displaying their Isen All Season Road bicycle, designed in line with their ethos of creating beautiful, handmade bikes that incorporate new technologies into traditional frame building.

Coming from backgrounds in engineering and design, **Silo Studio** is the design collaboration of **Attua Aparicio Torinos** and **Oscar Lessing**, who formed the partnership while studying on the Design Products course at the Royal College of Art, London. Their work mixes craft and technology, looking at how industrial processes and materials can shape design, and they will demonstrating their NSEPS (Not So Expanded Polystyrene) manufacturing process in a series of workshops where participants can make their own objects to take home. (Silo Studio will also be showcasing a selection of their unique pieces in the Barbican Shop from 2 April to 15 April).

As part of London Craft Week, south London based tapestry weaver **Christabel Balfour** will be weaving a whole rug in the Barbican Shop over a period of five days. The completed rug will be displayed in the shop until Sunday 20 May. For her rug, Christabel will be taking inspiration from Yto Barrada's exhibition in Barbican's Curve, *Agadir* (7 Feb to 20 May 2018); drawing from Barrada's multimedia practice, Moroccan textile traditions and the Brutalist architecture of both Agadir and the Barbican itself.

This four-hour class with Christabel Balfour will cover the basics of hand-weaving before building up to more advanced techniques to make a wall-hanging that can be taken home. Participants will learn how to set up and wrap their looms, create a fringe for their wall-hanging and start weaving, before moving on to building shapes, blending colours and creating texture with soumak and rya knotting.

Saffron Frameworks is a south-east London based frame builder with a passion for designing and creating beautiful but functional bicycles, and will be displaying a show bike in the Barbican Shop from 21 to 27 May.

Originally from New Zealand and now based in London, designer/maker Phil Cuttance will be demonstrating the art of casting stone objects and vases using Jesmonite Stone (an eco-friendly water based fine cement-like material), alongside an installation of large sculptural pieces.

Participants will learn how to cast a bud vase from Jesmonite Stone with designer/maker Phil Cuttance. They will choose from six different vase shapes, assemble their mould, and then mix and cast their own vase in a unique colour scheme.

The first of its kind in the world, the Workbench Box makes it possible to carve custom rings at home. The box includes all costs involved in making a ring including silver or gold, UK postage for delivering the carved ring to The Workbench for polishing, and for polishing time in their workshop. The Workbench is an east London collective that will be running a series of ring carving workshops during the Barbican's *Make!* season.



Herringbone Pen Pot by Phil Cuttance

A pen pot by London based designer/maker Phil Cuttance, who will be running a series of casting demonstrations and workshops during the Barbican's *Make!* season. Each piece in the Herringbone range
