16 January —23 March: Barbican Music Library Exhibition Making Music together:

A celebration of leisure-time music in the UK

The exhibition features quotes, posters and film contributed by Making Music member groups alongside a specially commissioned series of portraits of leisure-time musicians.

GILGAMESH RETOLD -Poet Jenny Lewis takes a fresh look at the ancient Mesopotamian epic

Jenny Lewis' *Gilgamesh Retold* (Carcanet Press, 2018) relocates Gilgamesh to its earlier, oral roots in a Sumerian society where men and women were more equal, the reigning deity of Gilgamesh's city, Uruk, was female (Inanna), only women were allowed to brew beer and keep taverns and women had their own language – emesal.

This shift of emphasis captures the powerful allure of the world's oldest poem and gives it a fresh, more human dynamic. In celebration of **World Poetry Day** Jenny will present extracts from the book, talk about her award-winning doctoral research into the Epic of Gilgamesh at Goldsmiths, and show how new ways of interpreting old texts can help us to experience them afresh and open them up to new audiences. Free, no booking required.

Biography

Jenny Lewis is an Arts Council Funded poet, playwright, children's author, translator and songwriter who teaches poetry at Oxford University. She has published four books of poetry and had seven plays and poetry cycles performed at major theatres including the Royal Festival Hall and Pegasus Theatre, Oxford. Since 2012, she has worked with the Iraqi poet Adnan al-Sayegh on a major project, 'Writing Mesopotamia', aimed at fostering friendships between English and Arabic-speaking communities.
