Our two main hubs in Barbican Level -1 and Charterhouse Square are the perfect places for you to chill out today. Get some food, wander through some installations or just recharge.

### Four things you must do today

1. Hear something new Sound Unbound is all about unexpected music so spend some time experimenting, be it Bach cello music with a technological twist

- or Renaissance music on electric guitars. 2. Find your own hidden part of London Whether it's a tropical conservatory, a secluded side-street, a blockbuster film location or a tranquil garden, discover your very own secret part of the city – all to the strains of live music.
- Head to the main stage The Barbican Hall is a big space built for big sounds - the perfect place to experience the power of a symphony orchestra in full flight.

## What to do if...

#### ...You're new to classical music

- Be transfixed by the symphony that changed music forever – Beethoven's Eroica – introduced by classical music fanatic Stephen Fry. (Barbican Hall, 12noon)
- See Jess Gillam BBC Young Musician 2016 finalist and the youngest ever saxophonist to reach No 1 in the classical charts – in a solo recital. (Milton Court Concert Hall, 6.15pm)
- Get up close and intimate with the revolutionary Ragazze Quartet, as they play string quartets old and new. (LSO St Luke's, 1pm)
- Look out for the electrifying string ensemble Collectif9, who will be popping up in various locations with their own brand of high-energy musical fun.

#### ...You're here to explore

- The Charterhouse, located just off one of our main festival hubs, is a must-see, hosting music from the medieval to the present day in its incredible Tudor interiors.
- Visit St Bart's the Great London's oldest parish church, home to Damien Hirst's impactful sculpture Exquisite Pain, a go-to film location, and venue for soothing choral music.
- Head to Smithfield Rotunda to embark on a musical walking trail around the historic streets of Smithfield.
- Be sure to visit the Barbican Conservatory it's not every day you can watch koi carp, terrapins, and wander around this tropical oasis to the strains of Mozart and Klezmer.

- ...You're here to chill out • Kick back to mesmerising classical, ambient
- and electronic improvised piano music from Tom Rogerson, written in collaboration with Brian Eno. (Piano Smithfield, 1.15 & 3.45pm) Be enthralled by the mellow sounds of J S Bach's
- music performed on marimbas. (Milton Court Concert Hall, 1 & 2.30pm)
- Hear J S Bach's beautiful Cello Suites recomposed for cello and synths, lending shades of Steve Reich and Max Richter to the Baroque master's infinite creativity. (Barbican Hall, 4.45pm)

#### ...You're here to discover cutting-edge sounds

- Rock out to Renaissance music reborn for a digital age with electric guitar group Zwerm. (St Giles' Cripplegate, 5pm)
- Discover the pop music of the 17th century in 21st-century singer-songwriter arrangements with genre-defying singer Nora Fischer and guitarist Marnix Dorrestein. (Barbican Cinema 1, 2.45pm & Charterhouse Chapel, 6pm)
- Join electronica producer Max Cooper and pianist Bruce Brubaker as they team up to reimagine the music of minimalist giant Philip Glass. (Barbican Hall, 8pm)

### ...You're here with young children

- Go on a time-travelling musical aadventure at the Museum of London. (11 & 11.45am, 12.30, 2.15, 2.45 & 3.30pm)
- Be taken on a whirlwind tour of minimalism at our music and movement family workshop. (Fountain Room, 11am & 2.15pm)
- Get creative with The Rig, an interactive installation of upcycled everyday objects turned musical instruments and sound experiments in Charterhouse Square.
