



It is with great pleasure that I present our first ever annual Patrons Report. The months from April 2022 – March 2023 were some of the most dynamic, innovative months that this Centre has seen – and we couldn't have done it without our Patrons.

Through generous donations toward the Barbican Centre Trust from Patrons, individuals, trusts, foundations, and corporations, we were able to raise £2.3m last financial year. This vital income helps the Barbican present hundreds of different performances, events and exhibitions.

So much has changed in the world over the past year, not least grappling with a cost-of-living crisis which has seen many people cut back on art and culture. However, through our ticket subsidy programmes, we've been able to discount over 82,000 tickets for schools, students, families and young people. That's something we're very proud of.

There have been many highlights over the past year. In the Theatre, we've had the Royal Shakespeare Company's Olivier award-winning production of My Neighbour Totoro. In our Curve gallery we presented the first major UK commission by Iranian artist Soheila Sokhanvari, which celebrated and commemorated feminist icons from pre-revolutionary Iran. Our bustling Hall welcomed musicians from across the globe including the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra, Lykke Li and Devonté Hynes.

Our commitment to nurture the talent pipeline and young people has seen us run over 250 learning activities and events to over 49,000 participants in 2022/23, providing the resources needed for more young people to develop their artistic practice and access jobs in the creative industry.

Looking ahead, we'll continue to progress our ambitious Barbican Renewal Programme, a major programme of investment to upgrade and revitalise our building allowing us the opportunity to create a physical space that serves our creative vision by being inclusive, accessible, sustainable and enterprising. We are transforming in other areas too, including our major programme of work around Equity, Diversity and Inclusion, to make sure the Barbican is a place where everyone belongs and can reach their full potential.

I think you know that the arts matter more now than ever. Your contribution has helped entertain and inspire millions of people, create connections, and provoke debate. Thank you for all that you have done for the Barbican, and all you continue to do.

You are truly advocates and champions of the arts.


