The Barbican invites visitors to roll up their sleeves this summer and explore a new festival of creative activities and performances for all ages. **Play Make Do** brings local communities together to inspire playful imagination, connection and hands-on adventure. The inaugural festival runs from **13 July – 16 August 2025**, with events delivered in collaboration with leading artists and companies from across the creative sector.

Play Make Do is a new initiative from the Barbican's Creative Collaboration department, building on from last summer's hugely popular 'anti-exhibition' in The Curve, Our Street,

which invited children and families to play through games, performance and conversation. *Play Make Do* is taking place all over the iconic arts centre this year. The line-up includes even more interactive and breathtaking sessions to entertain the whole family, focusing on the joyful and transformative moments experienced when different generations unlock their creativity together.

The ground floor foyer will fizz with fun for all ages, with free, collaborative events including: design-your-own imaginary playground inside the Barbican's brutalist walls, led by collage experts **Artizine UK**; drop-in to our summer **Play Space** packed with giant games and timeless playground classics; travel to the forest through interactive sensory materials, supported by experienced playworkers **Assemble Play Works**.

From the forest world to a tropical paradise, head to the Barbican Conservatory for free, breathtaking, high-flying performances from award-winning contemporary circus disruptors **Upswing**, with opportunities for audiences to try out their own aerial techniques or circus skills at floor-level. Or restore calm with **Mei Quan Academy**'s morning of outdoor **Tai Chi** on the picturesque Lakeside.

Ramp up the rhythm with afternoons of joyful communal dance in the atmospheric subterranean foyers: learn fiery and beginner-friendly Cuban Salsa with **Rueda Libre**; join an inclusive ceilidh dance party with spirited live music provided by **Queer Folk**'s in-house ceilidh band.

Celebrate one of the most spellbinding ancient traditions - the magic of storytelling - in further free sessions: get stuck into the 2025 Summer Reading Challenge with storytime inspired by nature and the great outdoors, hosted by the **Barbican Children's Library**; internationally acclaimed children's author and CBeebies' favourite **Chitra Soundar** performs tales from India; award-winning Sierra Leonean performer **Usifu Jalloh** returns with a new interactive adventure inspired by Anansi folklore.

Everyone can discover new skills and explore their own creative voice, with **workshops** on **illustration**, **storytelling** and **kite making**. For young people, week-long creative camps encourage 11-16 year olds to be creative and build confidence in hand-made animation filmmaking and devising theatre, and an intergenerational drama workshop session inspired by the spectacular summer production in the Barbican Theatre focuses on the themes of family, tradition and resilience.

While many of the events are free, audiences are advised to secure their place by booking via barbican.org.uk, tickets available from today.

Oluwatoyin Odunsi, Senior Producer Creative Collaboration, Barbican, said:

"We are so excited to welcome families to the Barbican Centre, especially those from our local communities, to take part, have fun and explore their creativity this summer. We have brought together fantastic and passionate collaborators at the top of their fields, to give the public a taste of everything the Barbican has to offer. By spending quality time together and having fun, we hope everyone who comes along will be energised, relaxed and inspired to explore whatever they can imagine."

Karena Johnson, Head of Creative Collaboration, Barbican, said:

"We are thrilled to continue building on our department mission to hold space which invites people to play and explore their creativity. In a time when families are under pressure, we are committed to our arts centre being an affordable and free civic space for London's

diverse communities to encounter extraordinary artists and try something new. We're offering many routes in this summer, inviting new audiences and neighbours who have may have felt excluded to make new memories with us, and to feel that this local arts centre is absolutely theirs."

Further highlights for the Barbican Centre's summer programming includes **Frequencies**, a curated season about the power of sound featuring a packed programme of film screenings, concerts, events, workshops and talks. The season (May – August) explores how the power of sound moves more than just the body, and how it continues to inspire generations to rebel and create change.

Highlights within Frequencies include **Feel the Sound**, a bold new multi-sensory exhibition experience across the whole Barbican Centre that examines our relationship to sound; the world premiere of a new version of the award-winning Virtual Reality experience **In Pursuit of Repetitive Beats**; **Rebel Radio**, a celebration of London's pirate radio story.

Frequencies also features a series of concerts bringing audiences on sonic adventures through immersive sound experiences, exploring dance, rave and Carnival culture. Concerts include Rampage: Carnival Classics 2, a special night that sees the Rampage Sound System return, this time joined by the 30-piece Nu Civilisation Orchestra to reimagine Carnival classics and celebrate over three decades of iconic tracks that define the sounds of Notting Hill Carnival. A much-awaited return by Jeff Mills with the Barbican's Resident Orchestra, the London Symphony Orchestra for a very special evening marking the 20th anniversary of Blue Potential, Mill's groundbreaking 2005 project and 2006 album combining electronic and symphonic music.

Frequencies is part of <u>Barbican's Summer 2025</u>, a season packed with unmissable events in Theatre, Music, Cinema, Visual Arts and more, including <u>Encounters: Giacometti x Huma Bhabha</u>; <u>Fiddler on the Roof</u> and <u>Good Night, Oscar</u> in the Barbican Theatre; Classical concerts <u>Khatia Buniatishvili & Friends</u> and <u>CBSO Orchestral Qawwali with Abi Sampa</u>; as well as <u>Herbie Hancock</u> celebrating his 85th birthday; a film season and two special <u>Classical Music</u> concerts celebrating <u>PRIDE</u> in June; and Barbican's <u>Outdoor Cinema</u> with its full season of films under the stars.

Brigitte Adela is a theatre director, sound artist and facilitator. She has worked as a collaborator with London's leading cultural institutions and independent companies including the National Theatre, Almeida Theatre, Young Coneys cohort, artsdepot and Tamasha.

Chitra Soundar is an internationally published, award-winning author of children's books, writer of kids TV, audio and theatre. She has published over 60 books for children of all ages, across genre and format. Her books have been nominated and shortlisted for multiple awards in the UK and US including the Kate Greenaway Medal for Illustration, Surrey Children's Book Award and Inclusive Book Awards. She is also the co-founder of Colourful Connections, a collective for PoC in UK Kids Media and the co-founder of SAIL Fest, UK's first South Asian Literature Festival. Her TV recent credits include Music Time (Netflix) and The Woohoos (Channel 5: Milkshake!), and her young fiction series Nikhil and Jay is currently airing on CBeebies. Chitra has written multiple episodes on the show and serves as one of the executive producers.

Nia Fekri is an Iranian-British artist and educator whose practice spans moving image, writing, and performance. Her work often explores themes of migration and familial relationships. As an educator and facilitator, she focuses on collaborative storytelling and speculative practice across a range of media.

Queer Folk was founded by Sophie Crawford and George Sansome and now encompasses a network of many more musicians, dancers, songwriters, music fans, and likeminded LGBTQIA+ people. Queer Folk amplify LGTBQIA+ performers and history, foster collaborations, and encourage the building of LGBTQIA+ community in the trad folk scene. They run regular Queer Ceilidh Dance Parties at Cecil Sharp House in London, present a monthly radio show at <u>Voices Radio</u>, and often host workshops, concerts, and LGBTQIA+ artist showcases.

Founded by Crown and Jessie, **Rueda Libre** is London's home of outdoor Cuban Salsa. Their classes are detailed with a mix of history, culture and laughs, leading ruedas that are fun, challenging and full of flavour. Nourishing a growing community of Latin dancers, hundreds of people each week join their distinctive group dance classes in King's Cross.

Suhayla Ibrahim is a London-based illustrator, winner of the FAB Prize for Illustration (2022). Born in Britain and of Sudanese heritage, she likes to depict characters from different backgrounds in her

work as well as humour and archetypes of animals and objects. She loves using colours and creating a playful aesthetic. Alongside her illustration work, Suhayla is a multidisciplinary creative director and stylist making content across fashion, lifestyle and music.

Upswing is a multi-award-winning UK-based contemporary circus company based in Stoke-on-Trent. Founded by artistic director Vicki Dela Amedume in 2006, they use the human body to tell new stories in extraordinary ways – amplifying and celebrating the skills, creative talents and stories of diverse artists and communities. With co-commissioners and producers including Stratford Circus, National Theatre, Roundhouse, Channel 4 and Hull UK City of Culture, Upswing have created an electrifying portfolio of work that regularly tours nationally and internationally. Upswing is a National Portfolio Organisation receiving core support from Arts Council England.

Usifu Jalloh is an award-winning storyteller, performer, and educator with over 20 years of experience in arts education. Born in Kamakwie, Sierra Leone, his storytelling encompasses music, dance, and multilingual narratives rooted in African oral traditions. He founded Maambena Fest and the National Storytelling Festival in Sierra Leone to inspire and educate young people to learn more about their culture. Usifu's theatre productions include Africa's Cowfoot, The Cowfoot Chronicles and One Cowrie Shell, and he recently performed in The Secret Lives of Baba Segi's Wives at Arcola Theatre. Film work includes creating The Cowfoot Prince documentary with director Bex Singleton and the National Film and Television School. As an international performer, he has worked across five continents, collaborating extensively with the BBC and clients including WHO, British Council Sierra Leone and the Obama Foundation. In 2021, he co-curated This is Africa for Coventry City of Culture.
